A dedicated Vincentian since 2010, Sonja has contributed her time and talents in many different roles, reflecting her deep commitment to serving others. She was the vice president & then president of the Our Lady of Grace conference in West Sacramento & was a home visit team leader for 7 years. For the past 6 years she has been the Yolo/Metro District President, in that time of guiding conferences she also was able to help establish new conference locations & bring back old conferences.

In 2021, she partnered with the Yolo Food Bank for "Feeding America Program" receiving food from local grocery stores to distribute to conferences and more. In 2022, she was active in the creation & implementation of the Ozanam Orientations; establishing the Council Formation teams & joining West Region as traveling formator.

Outside of SVdP, Sonja has served her community to address homelessness, food insecurity & providing resources for school-aged children. Her civic engagement includes being active in the Yolo County Homeless & Poverty Action Coalition, Yolo County's Children's Alliance & the City of West Sacramento Room Key program—where she helps to feed 100 people per week.

"I will lead with enthusiasm & passion for our organization, inspiring others to join our cause & contribute their talents & dedication," says Sonja. "I truly appreciate the mentoring received over the past 6 years which has allowed me to grow as a leader & taken on many roles to prepare me for this position."

Sonja's main goals in her new role include ensuring diversity of finances for continued financial stability, seeking to provide more essential items & services to the homeless & those without conferences & continuing to expand the Transitions to Permanent Housing Solutions program at the Council level to serve the latter.

On supporting the growth of Vincentians, Sonja said, "we must prioritize the growth of our Vincentian community in both numbers & spirituality. This involves defining our vision, mission & core values, ensuring that everyone understands their roles & responsibilities. As Vincentians, our vocation is an ongoing process of growing & developing in the tradition, charism, & spirituality of SVdP, being shaped through the Holy Spirit, for our work."

DEACON RICH KOPPES - A MODEL OF VINCENTIAN IDEALS

Richard Koppes, a founding & active member of the St. Anthony's SVDP conference, passed away on September 9, 2025. Rich lived a faith filled life dedicated to service & those he loved.

Rich was the driving force behind establishing a SVDP conference at St. Anthony's. Where Rich saw a need, he would look for a way to meet that need. His life was truly an example of Vincentian service.

In addition to SVDP, Rich was involved in numerous other ministries dedicated to serving the poor, the marginalized, and those in crisis. Rich made faith the center of his life through his service as a deacon at St. Anthony Parish for 40 years.

Rich and his beloved wife, Connie, were involved in countless ministries that served the greater Sacramento area including Family Promise, the Sacramento Life Center, the Exodus Project, Christ the King Retreat Center, South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership, & many more. Rich had a deeply generous heart. Together they had a passionate devotion to each other and their family, immediate, extended, parish and broader community.

Much of Rich's ministry was focused on building and nurturing relationships with others through listening & one on one support. His hobby was helping people. It is hard to convey the impact that Rich & Connie have had to those in need in our community.

In addition to his life of service, Rich was also an incredibly influential attorney. He was widely regarded as a pioneer of corporate governance. He was involved in numerous professional organizations, served on several boards, & taught at Stanford as well. The National Law Journal named him as one of the country's 100 most influential lawyers. He received this honor as well as many other lifetime achievement awards throughout his career. Rich will be missed by so many.


Another note stated:

So that is a blessing. We did get another car. The car payment is a little bit steep, more than we expected, but the last two months we have been making it happen and everything is going fine. We have essentially caught up on most of our bills. We have made a lot of payment arrangements with different companies. We are almost back on track.

I just wanted to let you know I appreciate you checking in on us and we really appreciate your help with food and help with the PG&E and utility bills. That was a great blessing for us and helped us get back on track like we needed to be. So again, thank you guys and all the other people in the organization, even the nice ladies that came out to the house. Thank you so much again and have a good day! All right, bye, bye."

SVdP Case Managers & Volunteers providing short & long term emergency relief to households in Butte & Tehama Counties affected by fires.

SMALL BUT MIGHTY, SVDP BRINGS HELP TO PARK FIRE SURVIVORS

Since beginning case management services in mid-March, \$96,915 in direct funding has been accessed for Park Fire Survivors in Butte and Tehama counties.

This has been a severely underfunded disaster, and only one case manager is available to help survivors. However, with commitment and diligence they have helped 18 families recover from this disaster.

Some of the assistance received includes:

- -Move-in assistance (first-month's rent and deposit.)
- -Tools and supplies for rebuilding.
- -Travel trailer to live in.
- -Replacement of tools for work.
- -Furniture and appliance replacement.

In September, \$12,000 in funding was accessed that will allow one survivor to build a tiny home on his property, where he raises rabbits and grows his own food. This survivor has a long history of living off the land and has even homesteaded in Alaska. He has been living in a tent on the property, after running out of money for a rental in town. The funding will not only give him a warm place to sleep at night, it will also allow him to take on a project he can take pride in, as this person has spoken at length about being able to build anything, anywhere.

In July, \$17,000 was accessed to purchase a trailer for a survivor to live in, replacing one that had mold and other issues that made it non-livable. The survivor said living in the conditions he had been living in had been affecting his mental health and his relationships. He had not been able to have his toddler daughter stay with him since the fire and was eager to have her back for more quality time.





LISTOS SVdP disaster preparedness program

LISTOS PREPARES THE COMMUNITY



The Listos team had 1,708 engagements between July & September. That means life-saving disaster preparedness information has been given to 1,708 people in Sacramento, Amador, Placer and El Dorado Counties.

The team began rolling out a community block party initiative that aims to help neighbors get to know each other so they can help each other when disasters strike. They hosted events at senior living communities in Placer County. El Dorado Hills, and Sacramento.

On September 19th, the Listos team hosted its first resource fair in the SVDP thrift store parking lot. There were 11 organizations in attendance, with information on resources for seniors and people with disabilities, along with low-cost car repair and weatherization programs, and more. Participants won prizes such as emergency preparedness backpacks with hand-crank radios, first aid kits and a power bank, and fire blankets to put out small fires.

Listos is a California Office of Emergency Services program that utilizes grants to community partners to reach vulnerable populations, such as seniors, people with disabilities and non-English speakers, with disaster preparedness information. SVdP has been a Listos Partner since June 2023.

HOMELESS CONNECT EVENT

DOT O'CONNOR, VOICE FOR THE POOR

The Homeless Connect Event aimed to provide immediate support and connect individuals experiencing homelessness with essential resources and long-term assistance programs. The event took place on Saturday, August 9th, at Sacramento State, where 48 food gift cards were distributed: 15 for Taco Bell, 15 for McDonald's, and 18 for Subway. The requested information was collected from all but two of the individuals assisted.

Brian Powers shared details about the Transition to Permanent Housing Solutions Program (TPHS), which offers rental assistance and case management to help individuals secure stable housing. Additionally, all participants received information about the Diocesan Helpline, which provides referrals to social services, and the Thrift Store, which offers affordable goods.

Rich and Connie Koppes' generosity has been instrumental in Exodus Project's growth and success. However, more than all he did, was who he was: a kind, humble, geniune human being. Exodus Project joins the rest of St. Vincent de Paul in mourning Rich's passing. May his memory be a blessing.

We will be remembering long-time supporter and mentor Rich Koppes at our Fall Fundraiser.
